Introduction

The purpose of this report is to demonstrate our compliance with Bill S-211 in regards to the Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act. The financial year for which we are reporting is November 1, 2023 to October 31, 2024. This is the first version of the report submitted by Powerscreen of Canada Ltd.

Every entity must, on or before May 31 of each year, report to the Minister on the steps the entity has taken during its previous financial year to prevent and reduce the risk that forced labour or child labour is used at any step of the production of goods in Canada or elsewhere by the entity or of goods imported into Canada by the entity.

Powerscreen of Canada Ltd. Has been in operation since 1974, and proudly remains an independently owned business, with headquarters located in Oshawa, Ontario.

Structure, Activities & Supply Chain

Powerscreen of Canada Ltd. is a private enterprise which was incorporated in 1974. Our primary function is as an equipment sales, service, and parts dealer for Terex Corporation which manufactures materials processing machinery, waste & recycling solutions, mobile elevating work platforms (MEWPs), and equipment for the electric utility industry. We are a dealer of material processing machinery, as well as waste & recycling solutions.

We do not manufacture any of the equipment that we sell. Our equipment and parts inventory are purchased directly from the manufacturer(s) and sold into our territory. Aftermarket parts (Non-OEM) for equipment are sourced locally.

Our territory covers Eastern Canada in the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, PEI, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland.

Policies & Due Dilligence

Powerscreen of Canada Ltd does not currently have any policies specifically addressing forced and/or child labour. We do have policies that demonstrate our commitment to treating employees fairly and keeping their health and safety in mind. These policies are outlined in our health and safety manual and can be provided upon request.

Powerscreen of Canada Ltd abides by all provincial labour & employment standards within the provinces we operate.

We predominately source our parts inventory directly from the manufacturer, and maintain open channels of communication regarding quality, supply limitations, as well as future business goals.

Terex has issued a statement in 2024 regarding child and/or forced labour: *“This statement (“Statement”) sets out the steps that Terex Corporation (“Terex” or the “Company”), on behalf of itself and its subsidiaries, has taken and is continuing to take to help ensure that modern slavery is not occurring within our business or our supply*

chains. Modern slavery encompasses slavery, servitude, human trafficking, child labour, and forced labour (collectively "Modern Slavery"). Terex has zero-tolerance for all forms of Modern Slavery within our business and supply chain. We are committed to acting ethically, with integrity, and transparency in all business dealings and to putting effective systems and controls in place to safeguard against Modern Slavery taking place."

When sourcing aftermarket (non-OEM) parts our management team carefully considers the reputation of the company, and their management team within the industry or local community, as well as the availability and cost of the goods.

Remediation of Forced and/or Child Labour, and Vulnerable Family Loss Income

Powerscreen of Canada Ltd has not identified any risk, therefore there is no need to remediate. To continue minimizing the risk of child and/or forced labour, we will continue to monitor, and engage in conversations with suppliers on the subject.

Training to Employees

Powerscreen of Canada Ltd. Currently does not have any forced and/or child labour awareness training in place. Employees are provided with, and encouraged to access the Health and Safety Manual as required.

Assessing Effectiveness

Powerscreen of Canada Ltd. Believes that the relationships we have tendered over the years allow us to be effective in assessing that the risk of any instance of forced and/or child labour in our supply chain is very low. As a dealer for Terex Corporation, we believe that their practices significantly minimize any potential risk to ourselves. Non-OEM parts, which are sourced locally also lend to our low risk of doing business with other entities that would be using forced and/or child labour.
