

Report in Accordance with the *Fighting Against Forced Labour and Child Labour in Supply Chains Act* (the “Act”) for the Financial Year April 1, 2025 to March 31, 2026.

The Alberta Gaming, Liquor and Cannabis Commission (“AGLC”) is an entity under the Act, distributing cannabis and liquor in Canada and importing into Canada liquor produced outside of Canada.

Structure, Activities and Supply Chains:

AGLC is an agent of the Crown in right of Alberta and a statutory corporation created pursuant to the *Gaming, Liquor and Cannabis Act* (RSA 2000). AGLC is the commercial entity responsible for overseeing the cannabis and liquor industries in Alberta and reports to the Minister of Service Alberta and Red Tape Reduction.

AGLC is the exclusive wholesaler of cannabis in the province of Alberta and purchases cannabis from Canadian producers only. Alberta licensed cannabis retailers may purchase cannabis only from AGLC for sales to the public.

AGLC is the exclusive wholesaler of liquor in the province of Alberta within the framework of a consignment model. Liquor suppliers from both within and outside of Canada consign their liquor to AGLC for sales to Alberta licensed liquor retailers. AGLC is the importer-of-record for all liquor originating outside of Canada. Attached to this report is a document listing the countries from which liquor is imported into Alberta in fiscal 2025. (See attached spreadsheet)

Policies and Due Diligence Process:

AGLC purchases cannabis exclusively from Canadian suppliers who are subject to Canadian laws prohibiting the use of forced labour and child labour.

On the liquor side there is no specific policy in place regarding forced labour in supply chains however under section 1.4.1(d) of the AGLC Liquor Agency Handbook, all agencies and their employees are required to comply with all federal, provincial, and municipal legislation. This section of the handbook compels all liquor agencies and their staff to follow the rules set out in Bill S-211.

While AGLC does import a portion of its liquor from outside of Canada, research of products and services most likely impacted by forced and child labour within supply chains has shown that liquor is not considered a high-risk category.

In 2025 it was determined that 79% of liquor imports into Alberta were from countries/regions with existing forced labour legislation (US, Mexico, UK, EU and Australia). Only 1,447 cases (0.02%) of the imported liquor wholesaled by AGLC in 2025 originated from the ten countries with the highest prevalence of forced labour as reported in the *Walk Free- Global slavery index*.

Forced Labour and Child Labour Risks:

Importation of liquor from certain countries carries a risk of forced or child labour being used. AGLC imports a very small proportion of its liquor from these countries. Based on the volume of

product imported from higher risk countries and research showing that liquor is not considered a high-risk product regarding use of forced labour, we believe the risk that products produced using forced labour are in our supply chain is very low.

Remediation Measures:

AGLC has determined that its supply chain does not carry a risk of forced or child labour being used that would require remediation at this point and, as such, remediation is not applicable for the purposes of this report.

Remediation of Loss of Income:

AGLC has not taken steps to eliminate forced or child labour that would have resulted in loss of income by vulnerable families. As such, no measures have been taken in this area.

Training:

AGLC has not conducted any training on forced or child labour.

Assessing Effectiveness:

Based on the determination that AGLC's supply chain does not carry a significant risk of forced or child labour, AGLC has not assessed its effectiveness in combatting the same within its supply chain.
